

He broke into the lineup as a sophomore and made an immediate impact. He picked off passes in each of Princeton's last two wins and is looking for more in 2008.

But he's also being asked for more. He understands the defense and needs to make sure everybody is organized. He is being asked to be a leader in the backfield, to be a standout.

He is ready to answer.

JUNIOR SAFETY WILSON CATES

2008 PREVIEW

In 2005 and 2006, Princeton did all the little things right. Those little things combined to become a very big thing — a 16-4 record and the program's first Ivy League championship in more than a decade.

Last season, while the desire was still there, the results were not. Turnovers and execution in the red zone, on both sides of the ball, cost Princeton during its first losing season since 2003. The Tigers ended the year on a positive note, a 17-14 overtime win at Dartmouth, but the bad taste of a November outside the championship race lingered into the offseason.

Led by a hungry Class of 2009, which is looking to become the first senior class to play for two Ivy League champions since the 1960s, Princeton turned those negative feelings into one of the most productive offseasons in the nine-year tenure of head coach Roger Hughes. The leadership was so stellar that Princeton voted for three captains — seniors **Brian Anderson**, **Adam Berry** and **Matt Koch** — for only the second time in the 140-year history of its football program.

Within the walls at Princeton Stadium, which celebrates its 10th anniversary this season, expectations are high. These players have experienced the thrill that comes with success and the pain that comes with failure. There is experience on both sides of the ball, but there are also positions where youth will need to shine. The little things will need to be done right if Princeton hopes to secure another big championship.

DEFENSE (7 starters returning, 4 starters lost):

DEFENSIVE LINE

The most experienced position on the defensive side of the ball is up front, where Princeton returns three starters from the 2007 line and a trio of backups with varying levels of experience. The amount of pressure this group brings in both the running and passing game will go a long way in determining the overall success of the Tiger defense.

Senior and two-time All-Ivy defensive end **Pete Buchignani** anchors one

side of the line. He recorded a career-best 34 tackles last season and had at least three stops in eight of 10 games last year. He has been an impact player since the fourth game of his freshman season, and his dedication off the field has only made him a more impressive physical force each season. Buchignani had all three of his tackles for losses late last season, including one in an impressive six-tackle game against Yale. He will look to add more sacks this season while still drawing double teams.

On the other side of the line, classmate **Tom Methvin** should also command the attention of opposing offensive lines. Methvin seemed poised for an All-Ivy season in 2007 of his own before injury derailed him, but he is fully healthy and looking to end his career on a high note. In his first four games of the season, including one against Hampton when he suffered his leg injury, he averaged nearly four tackles per game and had either a forced fumble or an interception in three straight games. He has a speed rush off the end that has helped him record 7.5 career sacks, including one when he returned to the field against Dartmouth. The Methvin-Buchignani bookends are hoping to repeat the magic of Joe Weiss and Tim Kirby in 2004, when both earned first-team All-Ivy honors.

The man in the middle is **Matt Koch**, whose limitless energy and drive make him a natural leader on the defense. He earned honorable mention All-Ivy honors last season after recording 37 tackles, despite constantly being double-teamed on run plays. He recorded three turnovers and forced a fumble, which demonstrated how consistently he was able to find the football and make something happen. Koch has a motor that keeps him pushing when many nose tackles begin to wear down, and he will need to be a productive force both late in games and late in the season, when Princeton hopes to still be playing for the big prize.

A successful three-man front doesn't depend solely on its starters. Defensive coordinator and defensive line coach Steve Verbit is looking for at least a five- or six-man rotation on the line, and he has several options on the two-deep.

Junior **Joel Karacozoff** made the most of Methvin's injury last season and set the foundation for a fine career in Orange and Black. He recorded 34 tackles, including 10 solo stops, and added 5.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. In one two-game span, including a contest at Harvard, he recorded 14 tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and added both of his sacks, a fumble recovery, a quarterback hurry and three pass breakups. He is both strong and quick, and he has shown an early ability to cause havoc in the offensive backfield.

Senior **Mark Ethridge** is also a reserve defensive end. He doesn't come into the season with the same experience as Karacozoff, but he is building off a strong spring and Verbit believes he could make an impact if he continues to improve during preseason camp.

Both **Pat Gallagher** and **Matt Boyer** are potential reserve nose tackles. Gallagher is a senior who made 13 tackles last season and added three stops for loss. He is as strong as any member of the defensive line and has the experience from last season to build on. Boyer was one of the most highly-touted members of last year's freshman class, and after a year of figuring out the college game, could be ready to make his presence known.

LINEBACKERS

The greatest experience belongs to the outside linebackers, where both **John Callahan** and **Collin McCarthy** will be expected to be leading forces at this key position. In a Princeton defense that relies on pressure, both of these players could be poised for All-Ivy seasons.

As a freshman, Callahan found his way into the rotation during the 2006 championship season. Now a junior, he is the most experienced linebacker in the group. Last season, he ranked third in the Ivy League

in sacks, fifth in tackles for loss and 19th in tackles. His final play of the season was a forced fumble in overtime at Dartmouth; two plays later, Connor Loudon kicked the game-winning field goal. As a nickel linebacker, Callahan will take on a bigger role in the run game and will rely on his athleticism, speed and game instincts to keep him near the ball.

McCarthy was the breakout linebacker in Don Dobes' group last season, and he is expected to become even more of a playmaker as the strongside starter this season. He is the fastest linebacker in the mix and can utilize his speed off the

perimeter to be the type of impact player that Brig Walker was during Princeton's championship run two seasons ago. In his first season of significant varsity experience, he recorded 56 tackles, including 33 solo stops, and had back-to-back 14-tackle efforts against Cornell and Penn.

Junior **Scott Britton** enters 2008 as the No. 1 middle linebacker on the depth chart. The defensive coaches have believed in his potential from the day he stepped on campus, but a knee injury midway through his freshman season slowed down his progress. He made 26 tackles in a reserve role last season and now, as an upperclassman, is healthy and ready to lead. Britton is in line for a position held by the recent likes of Zak Keasey, Justin Stull and Tim Boardman, all of whom both led Princeton in tackles and earned first-team All-Ivy recognition. Dobes believes Britton has the talent, energy and emotion to continue that tradition.

Sophomore **Steve Cody** had a terrific spring and enters the fall atop the depth chart at weakside linebacker. He is a young, physical player who brings high energy and has a high upside. His explosiveness will help him get into the backfield for key run stops or quarterback pressures, similar to what Doori Song did over the last two seasons. He was a track standout in high school, so he certainly has the speed to run down tailbacks and quarterbacks from behind.

Senior **Pat McGrath** is likely to see the most snaps among the reserves. After a strong 2006 season, McGrath missed all of last season and may need some time to shake off the rust, but he has the versatility that allows him to play outside linebacker or defensive end when Princeton goes to a four-man front. Juniors **Jeff Jackson** and **Brad Stetler** will also compete for time on the outside, while **John Duvall**, **Adam Fee** and **Jon Olofsson** are all potential inside reserves who will look to earn time with a strong fall camp.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

On the surface, it seems that the Princeton defensive backfield is the most inexperienced unit on this side of the ball. Both position coach Eric Jackson

and the players feel confident that their combined experience from last season and the overall strong spring season will lead to a much improved unit in 2008.

The key figure in the backfield, and possibly the entire defense, is junior cornerback **Cart Kelly**. Players like Jay McCareins and J.J. Artis have affected the entire defense by simply remaining on an island with the opposing team's top receiver, and Jackson feels that Kelly can assume that role. He has improved both his footwork and his understanding of defensive concepts, and that led to his impressive November 2007, by far his best month of football at Princeton. That stretch actually started at the end of October, when his interception helped the Tigers past Cornell; it was his first career interception and the highlight moment in a good first season as a starter, when he made 44 tackles and had seven pass breakups.

Senior **Barry Newell** is a potential starting corner opposite Kelly. Like Britton, Newell was in line for significantly more time before an injury kept him on the shelf, but he is back healthy and ready to make an impact in his final season. He brings valuable leadership and understanding to the position, but he will likely be tested early in the season and will look

to make an early impact.

Classmate **Tom Hurley**, a former starter, is coming off injury and missed the entire spring, so he is a bit of a wild card entering the fall. He has the technique to be a talented cornerback, so the coaches will wait and see how his rehab goes. Senior **Evan Ayasso** and sophomore **Glenn Wakam** are also potential options, especially in nickel and dime packages.

Junior **Wilson Cates** played more than 250 snaps last season and will be the leader of the safeties this season. Cates will be the No. 1 strong safety and will use his knowledge of the defense to recognize all possible scenarios and keep his backfield mates in the right position. Cates had 33 tackles last season and interceptions in each of Princeton's final two victories.

Junior **Carlos Roque** doesn't have the same experience, but he impressed the coaches in the fall and did get some early snaps last season. He will compete with senior **Pete Ploszek**, a converted running back who made a smooth transition to defensive back last season. Ploszek can move between corner and safety, allowing him to play in all formations. Sophomore **Grant Sieron** will also vie for time at strong safety.

OFFENSE (6 starters returning, 5 starters lost):**OFFENSIVE LINE**

For the last two seasons, this group has been viewed as an inexperienced unit. Those former freshmen and sophomores are now juniors and seniors, and head coach Roger Hughes believes that this unit can be the anchor of the entire offense, if not the whole team.

The starting tackles will be juniors **Mark Paski** and **J.P. Makrai**, both of whom bring a wealth of experience into the 2008 season. After becoming the first Princeton player to start every game of his freshman season on the offensive line, Paski improved even more last season and now comes into his third season as the leader and anchor of the line. He will protect the blind side of lefthanded quarterback Brian Anderson, similar to his role with Jeff Terrell in 2006. An athletic, intelligent leader, Paski has improved his run blocking while remaining a top-notch pass blocker.

Makrai was moved from guard to tackle in the offseason to take advantage of his athleticism. A starter at guard since the middle of his freshman season, he is a strong run blocker. Position coach Adam Hollis is confident that his quickness will be better served as a tackle, where he can get out on the perimeter in the spread offense and succeed as a pass blocker.

Fellow juniors **Andrew Hauser** and **Marc Daou** are returning starters at the guard position. Hauser has the athleticism to move to tackle if needed, but he is a powerful blocker who is skilled in combo blocks and has great feet. Daou's strength is his actual strength; he is as physical as any lineman and can move nose tackles off the ball in the run game. Both will be key in the inside run game.

Senior **Matt Reynolds** is the expected starter at the center position. He started the 2007 season finale at Dartmouth, which ironically was Anderson's first start at quarterback, so the two began to develop a chemistry last season. Hollis trusts Reynolds' intelligence in calling out blocks and keeping the unit on the same page. In the spread offense, he will also be expected to handle the shotgun snap, which he did well with in the spring. Fellow senior **Nick Morgan** also brings experience into the season and is able to move into either the center or guard positions if needed.

Junior **Greg Chambers** and sophomores **Dusty Davidson** and **Andrew Mills** will also compete for time in the offensive line rotation.

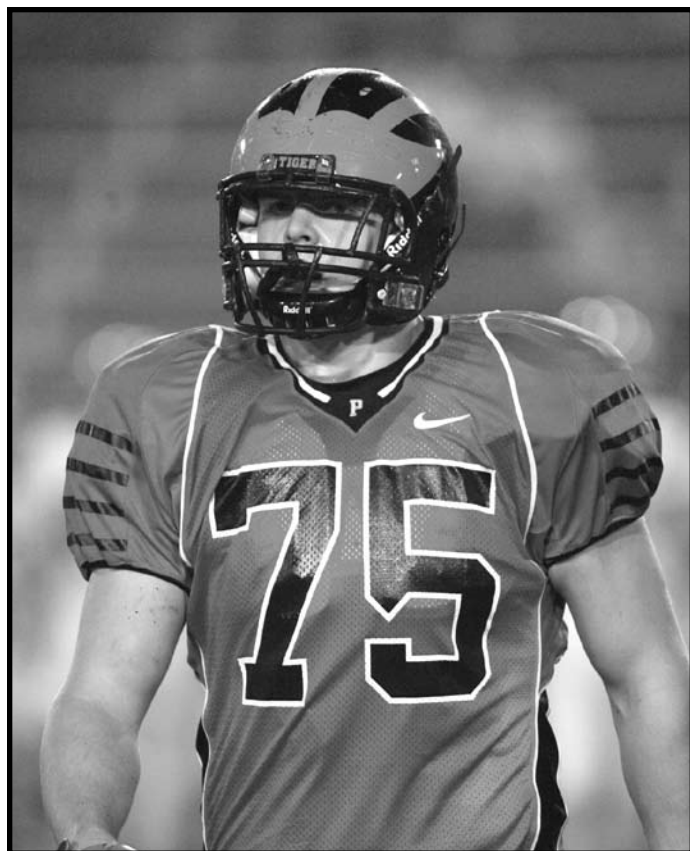
WIDE RECEIVERS/TIGHT END

There is considerable depth at the wide receiver position, although Hughes and wide receiver coach/passing game coordinator Scott Sallach are looking to see if anybody will step up as the No. 1 receiver. His top two candidates are a pair of hard-working seniors who have experienced their own successes but have yet to put a strong full season together.

Tri-captain **Adam Berry** is one of the most hard-working and knowledgeable players on the field, and he was a natural fit as one of the team captains. He caught 26 passes last season and leads all active players with 43 career catches, including three touchdowns. Although a reliable possession receiver, his 16.2 yards per catch last season proves he can make something happen after he makes the catch. He is the team's most well-rounded receiver and excels as a downfield blocker, an absolute necessity in the spread offense.

Classmate **Will Thanheiser** is the more explosive option and could develop into the deep threat in this offense. Thanheiser led all returning players with 27 catches last season, including five catches apiece against Brown and Yale. He developed a nice chemistry with Brian Anderson during the spring and, as one of the taller receivers, could also become a favored red-zone target.

Sophomore **Trey Peacock** got invaluable varsity time late last season when Brendan Circle was injured, and he enters his second season with

the expectation of making a consistent impact in the offense. Another tall, physical presence, Peacock caught six passes in 2007 and earned the team's top offensive freshman honor. With added confidence and expanded knowledge of the offense, he could become an effective third receiver. The same could be true for **Matt Ransom**, a speed threat who the coaches believe could also be the answer in the return game. Ransom saw limited duty in the offense late last season, but it was enough to get a sense of the speed at this level. It is speed that he possesses, and speed that could turn him into a scary target.

Fellow sophomore **Andrew Kerr** missed his freshman season with injury, but he is a player for which the coaches have very high hopes. The State College, Pa., native is 6-2 with good hands and will look to gain as much experience as possible in the preseason before heading into his first season as a healthy competitor.

An injury to Jake Staser cost Princeton production at the tight end spot last season, but Hughes is hopeful that senior **Joe Magro** can make the position viable again this year. He was always a threat in the passing game, but he improved his blocking in the run game during the offseason. That versatility should keep him on the field in most packages and keep defenses aware of him. **Billy Mitchell**, **Zack Kranz** and **Harry Flaherty** will all compete for time at the position as well.

RUNNING BACKS

On a rainy Friday night last fall, a potential star was unveiled to the nation. Junior **Jordan Culbreath** torched the Cornell defense for 145 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-28 win. He ran for scores of 49 and 58 yards, and the latter was so impressive that it was voted the "Top Play" on SportsCenter that night. He is a physical, quick tailback who can find the opening and sprint through it. The coaches hope he becomes a consistent and productive force in the run game over a full season, as well as a viable threat to catch the ball and a consistent blocker.

Senior **R.C. Lagomarsino** is the more experienced back and led all returning players with a 32.9 rushing average last season and seven career touchdowns. When healthy, Lagomarsino is dangerous. He can get through the smallest seam in the line or take an option pitch the distance, as he did at Harvard last season. Staying healthy has been the issue for him, but if he can split time with Culbreath, he could be most productive in his final season.

For the first time in three years, the fullback position will be occupied by someone other than Rob Toresco. Offensive coordinator and running backs coach Dave Rackovan believes in sophomore **Matt Zimmerman**, who can handle the blocking duties of the position and can also pick up a tough first down when given the chance. The offense has always been more dangerous when all members of the backfield are threats with the ball, so Zimmerman will get his chances to make plays. Junior **Ryan Smith** could also earn time at fullback, especially in short-yardage situations.

QUARTERBACK

The spread offense needs an athletic line, versatile wide receivers and tailbacks who can run and catch. In the end, though, the offense will only be as successful as the quarterback running it.

Senior **Brian Anderson** was voted tri-captain in 2008 despite starting only one game in his career. Granted, it was an impressive one, as he completed his first 11 passes against Dartmouth, ran for a touchdown and set up the winning field goal despite breaking his thumb midway through the game. Still, it was only one start. He was elected captain because of his intangibles, such as leadership and determination. But as he showed against Dartmouth, he does have the tangible qualities to be an effective quarterback. He had terrific poise, moved well in and out of the pocket and threw the ball on the run.

It may be unfair to ask your first-year starter to go out and lead your offense effectively on a week-to-week basis, but that's what it

takes to win in the Ivy League. Jeff Terrell won seven games in his first season as a starter, and he did it with an experienced offensive line and depth at the skill positions. Anderson will have both, and while his numbers don't need to break records for Princeton to win, he must have a high completion percentage, limit his interceptions and score touchdowns inside the red zone.

Junior **Dan Kopolovich** moved from starting

cornerback to reserve quarterback during the offseason, which is another indication of just how important the position is in the offense. Kopolovich had been a consistent presence in the defensive backfield for two years, but he came to Princeton as an all-state quarterback from the Pittsburgh area, where he ran the option all the way to a state title. He will need the full fall to shake off the offensive rust, but Hughes trusts his mental toughness and believes he can make the right plays if needed this season.

Sophomore **Andrew Dixon** continued to improve during the spring and needs to keep improving his knowledge of the offense and his arm strength, while classmate **Brett Kan** missed all of his freshman year with an injury but will return in the fall.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Princeton returns two reliable kickers in **Ryan Coyle** and **Connor Louden**. Coyle, the reigning first-team All-Ivy punter, was named to the Consensus Draft Services FCS preseason All-America first team during the summer of 2008 after ranking sixth nationally with 43.1 yards per punt in 2007. He worked hard daily while four-time All-Ivy punter Colin McDonough dominated the league, but now that his time has come, he has made the most of it. He earned Ivy League Special Teams Player of the Week honors after averaging 45.1 yards per punt, including a 69-yarder, against Lafayette. He worked on better ball placement in the offseason, which may cut down on his gross yardage but help his net yardage.

Louden overcame a potential career-ending leg injury to make 9 of 11 field goals last season and all of his point-after attempts. He has never missed an extra point in 49 attempts and is only 10 away from the Princeton record of 59 straight PAT makes. With another offseason to improve the strength in his leg, he should have greater range in 2008.

An unsung hero over the past three years has been long snapper **Ryan Pritchard**, who has been nothing short of consistent throughout his career. He has handled every long snap in his career and usually puts the ball exactly in the right spot.

Hughes is hopeful to see an improved return game this season. Berry and Ransom both proved to be capable returners last season, but if either can improve into a more dangerous threat, it would be extremely beneficial to the offense.
